

Transition Year- What is it ?


The Transition Year Programme is a unique one year programme that promotes the personal, social, vocational and educational development of students and prepares them for their role as autonomous, participative and responsible members of society.

(Transition Year Guidelines, 1994, Department of Education

Why do Transition Year?

TY provides a bridge to enable students to make the transition from the more dependent type of learning associated with Junior Cycle to the more independent learning environment associated with Senior Cycle.





What is the Purpose of TY?

- Maturity in Studies by making them more selfdirected learners
- Maturity in relation to work and careers from work experience.
- Personal and Emotional Maturity –communication skills, dealing with conflict, self-confidence and a sense of responsibility
- Social Maturity- developing people skills and more awareness of the world outside.
- Maturity subject choices

Self- Directed Learning

- The student takes the initiative herself- with or without the help of others.
- Recognising her learning needs
- Setting Goals
- Finding Resources
- Recognising when she needs help and how to find it.

Student Voice – what did they say?

- "I made new friends and now I feel more confident".
- "Even though we did not win the game it was still a great experience".
- " I am much clearer about my senior subject options now".
- " I thought I was going to do science in college but now, I am thinking about doing law".
- " I have a much better understanding of people with special needs".
- " My confidence in speaking in front of people has grown.... TY has made me more inclined to move out of my comfort zone"





- Peer Pressure in college









Preparation for the World of Work

Purpose

The Link Module, Preparation for the World of Work, is designed to provide the student with a general knowledge of the world of work, the skills to find employment and experience in an adult working environment.

Preparation for the World of Work

- Introduction to Working Life
- Job Seeking Skills
- Career Investigation
- Work Placement

Preparation for the World of Work – Introduction to Working Life

- Local Area Investigation "My Own Place"
- Visit to a local enterprise
- Visit / classroom visitor



Preparation for the World of Work Career Investigation

- Must be completed by all LCVP Students
- Focus is on Skills
 - e.g. Research, Planning, Selecting Material, Networking
- Part of Careers Programme
- Must have an out of school component
 - e.g. interview, work shadow

Preparation for the World of Work Work Placement

- 5 day Placement or Equivalent is a requirement
- Linked to Voc. Subjects and/or Career
- Can be Work Shadowing along with other out-of-school work-related visits

e.g. 2 days work shadowing + visit to FÁS + interview + college open day

Enterprise Education

Purpose

The Link Module, Enterprise Education, encourages students to identify Enterprising skills, Profile an Entrepreneur, Investigate Business and Community Enterprises and set up their own Enterprise projects as vehicles of learning.



What is the Leaving Certificate Applied?



- It is a distinct, self-contained two-year Leaving
 Certificate programme aimed at preparing students for adult and working life
- It emphasises forms of achievement and excellence which the established Leaving Certificate has not recognised in the past



Who would benefit most?

- Someone who wants to stay in school & get a Leaving Certificate
- Someone who prefers learning by doing
- Someone who would be motivated by continuous assessment
- Someone who who wants to get work experience to help them with their career choice
- Someone who wants to develop skills which will help them in their future career



Rationale

- Prepares students for adult and working life
- Recognises talents of all pupils
- Promotes communication and decision making skills
- Applies knowledge and skills to the solution of real problems

LCA - A Different approach?

- Credits are gained by attending school, completing assignments, tasks and doing final exam.
- Work experience is undertaken every Friday.
- Subjects are relevant to everyday living and the world of work.


