## SCIENCE

In January, the Chemistry Department from UCC provided a workshop in school for the sixth year Chemistry students, 'Spectroscopy in a suitcase', to help with their understanding of this area of Chemistry for their Leaving Certificate. Two of our Transition Year students, Laura McCarthy and Máire O' Neill, took part in Sci-Fest in Tralee I.T. Their project was titled 'Moo cow test', which investigated proteins linked to pregnancy in cows, in the hope of developing a cow pregnancy test kit.

On May 3rd, Fifth Year Biology students went to Killarney National Park to participate in an Ecology fieldtrip, as part of their Leaving Certificate practical work. Here they learned the various techniques to identify types of plants and animals, as well as techniques to capture and release small mammals, such as bank voles and field mice. On April 29th, Fifth Year Agricultural Science students went to Neilus O' Connor's farm in Moyvane, who is a potato farmer. Here they learned about planting potatoes and the stages involved in planting, growing and caring for crops. Students also planted their own Kerr Pinks potatoes in school and will harvest these when the students return after summer. On May 15th, Fifth Year Agricultural Science students visited Kissane's farm in Ballylongford. This farm visit is in association with Teagasc. There were seven schools present with 135 students. The students were given a combination of talks, hands-on activities and demonstrations from an excellent group of people from Munster Bovine, Kerry Agribusiness, Teagasc, Dairy Master and Pallaskenry Agricultural College. This is a new initiative to educate students and help develop their knowledge of how farms operate and possible agricultural careers. Congratulations to our Second Year Science students who completed their first Classroom Based Assessment, involving carrying out experiments independently and evaluating their results. Our Third Year students completed their second Classroom Based Assessment, which involved them researching a topic that has an impact on our society. These assessments are part of the new Junior Cycle Science curriculum. All students performed very well and should be proud of the effort they put in to achieve such good results.

All staff and students in the school are now trained and certified in CPR. This is an initiative sponsored by Bank of Ireland, in association with the Irish Heart Foundation – CPR 4 Schools. Presentation Secondary School Listowel are the first school in Kerry to train all members of the school community. We are very proud of this achievement and hope that one day some of our school community will help to save lives. Sixth year Physics students attended a lab day in University of Limerick, learning the techniques involved in Physics experiments for Leaving Certificate Physics.

Transition year and Third Year students attended a physics workshop – "Sophia Project", presented by students from the University of Limerick. This is aimed to encourage more girls to pursue STEM subjects in the future.—*Mr C Kiely, Ms J. Normile,*

## GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING

### KERRY ETB

There is increased awareness about the Apprenticeships and Traineeships available to students in recent times. Some students expressed an interest in attending the Kerry ETB Training Centre in Tralee. We visited the centre on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> May. We were given a tour of the centre and detailed information on courses such as Beauty Therapy, Medical Secretary, Wind Turbine Maintenance Technician, TV, Radio and Broadcasting and Multimedia. The direct route to College is not for everyone and the 'earn and learn' approach demonstrated by apprenticeships provides a real alternative for students. Once associated only with trades such as Plumbing and Carpentry, this is now changing rapidly with areas now including Insurance, Bioscience, Auctioneering and Estate Agency to name but a few. They are providing a huge variety of options for students and an alternative to the College route and to attaining a Level 8 qualification.

Some apprenticeships such as Insurance Practitioner will allow students progress to Level 8 while being paid €23,000 per year. This compared to a student attending University who will have to pay €3000 on registration fees along with accommodation fees and living expenses. ### REACH +

As part of the Fifth and Sixth year weekly career class students work through a Reach + workbook and online portfolio. Here they will have the opportunity to store and log their results online to career interest tests and personality assessments. These are invaluable in deciding which career options to pursue after school. The current Fifth Years were recently evaluated on how effective they found this workbook in helping them with their career planning and the average response was found to be very positive.

While it involves an initial investment for parents it is an excellent guidance tool to be used throughout Fifth and Sixth Year and one which parents can read through also either online or in the workbook. More information on the REACH + Programme can be found at the following links:

### SURVIVING THE LEAVING CERT & MAINTAINING MENTAL HEALTH

At such a stressful time of the year, it is always worth bearing in mind that the Leaving Certificate is one exam and does not determine if someone is a success or not. I would really like to remind students that there are several options available to students even if the exam does not go to plan.

As discussed earlier the Apprenticeships and Traineeships are available to students. For those wishing to progress to college they can study a Post Leaving Certificate Course first and then progress to University. The PLC course requires an interview for entry and a place on the course is not determined by the number of points attained in the Leaving Certificate. Over the years we have had many students complete a PLC before progressing to college. They also give students a year to decide if a certain route is definitely for them. These applications are open now and some will still be available after the Leaving Certificate results.

When the results come out on 13<sup>th</sup> August it can be a rollercoaster for students as they may be worried that they have not achieved the necessary points. Points can rise and fall from year to year depending on demand so until the First Round offers will be released on August 15<sup>th</sup> try to remain as positive as possible.

I will be available to meet with students in school on August 15<sup>th</sup> and should anyone have any queries relating to their offers they are more than welcome to come into the school and meet with me.
