
2025 LEAVING CERTIFICATE STUDENTS RECEIVE THEIR MARKS

The STEM Passport for Inclusion Programme provides girls in Transition Year the opportunity to develop university accredited module based in STEM. They have worked with Industry and Educators, from across Ireland. The students learn to code, collaborate and create, providing students with a pathway to college courses and careers in STEM.





The Transition Year students have already done one trip where they made different activities that involved coding and programming, they also had an online mentoring meeting with successful women in the STEM area.

In the upcoming sessions of the STEM Passport for Inclusion programme, they will continue building their skills in coding and computational thinking. They will also work on team projects, learn more about innovation and design thinking, and explore real-world STEM careers. There will probably be more mentoring sessions with professionals from the industry, and they might begin preparing for the final assessments or presentations as part of the university-accredited module.

The film workshop hosted by professional film maker, Jesse, was on of the many workshops the TYs did in September.



Joining a local GAA Club


